Greetings Sisters and Brothers in Christ!

As Christians, we are called into a very special relationship. Now if you were thinking we are called into a relationship with the Triune God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; then you are absolutely correct. But if you were thinking about the relationship among the community of God's people then you would also be correct. Being part of the church means that we belong to one another through and in Jesus Christ. Christian community is a gift from God. Dietrich Bonhoeffer writes passionately in his short book *Life Together* about the meaning and significance of Christian community. Here are some of my favorite passages:

The physical presence of other Christians is a source of incomparable joy and strength to the believer. (p. 19)

The prisoner, the sick person, the Christian in exile sees in the companionship of a fellow Christian a physical sign of the gracious presence of the triune God. (p. 20)

It is easily forgotten that the fellowship of Christian brethren is a gift of grace, a gift of the Kingdom of God that any day may be taken from us ... therefore ... let him thank God on his knees and declare: It is grace, nothing but grace, that we are allowed to live in community with Christian brethren. (p. 20)

And that also clarifies the goal of all Christian community: they meet one another as bringers of the message of salvation. (p. 23)

Even when sin and misunderstanding burden the communal life, is not the sinning brother still a brother, with whom I, too, stand under the Word of Christ? (p. 28)

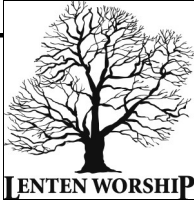
One could write much about this most precious gift of Christian community but at this point I don't feel the need to say more. Instead, I would invite you to reread these divinely inspired words of Bonhoeffer and ponder them in your heart. Thank you for being a blessing to our community!

Books for Adults

What does exercise have to do with our souls? How do our sleeping habits relate to being conformed to the likeness of Christ? What do our bodies have to do with spiritual formation? *The Life Of The Body: Physical Well-Being And Spiritual Formation* by Valarie E. Hess and Lane M.

Arnold takes these questions and shows that the life of our bodies has quite a bit to do with the life of our souls. This book explores such themes as: choices about what we eat, worshipping with our bodies, seasons of life for body and soul, and caring for the planet. Each chapter has reflection questions and creative exercises that help you engage body

and soul with these themes. (recommended in *The Lutheran*)

In the book *The Land Between: Finding God in Difficult Transitions*, author Jeff Manion uses the biblical story of the Israelites' journey through the Sinai desert as a metaphor for being in an undesired, transitional space. Manion explores the ways in which the Israelites' reactions provide guidance on how to respond to God during our own transitions in the modern world. Life is full of unwanted transitions: unemployment, foreclosure, illness, family crisis, and fear of an uncertain future. It is our response to the land between that will determine whether our journey through the desert will result in deep, lasting growth or prove destructive to the soul. (recommended in *The Lutheran*)

The Wonder Of Aging: A New Approach To Embracing Life After Fifty by Michael Gurian is a comprehensive and comforting road map of what to expect in the second half of your life. Most books about the years after fifty are about health and the physical symptoms that come with advancing age. This book goes beyond this to serve as both a spiritual guide and a practical exploration of the emotional and psychological dimensions of the second half of life. It looks at aging as something positive, life-giving, and miraculous. The world needs our wisdom, he argues, and he shows us how to develop and share it. The elder years can be a journey into something richer and deeper, full of hope and meaning rather than a sense of fate. This book gives the tools to revel in them to the fullest. (recommended in *The Lutheran*)

Book For Children

Note the books on display with an Easter theme.

The children's book for this month is *What's Heaven?* by Maria Shriver. Death eventually touches every family and this book is a starting point for parents who must talk about this difficult topic with their children. Many of the questions in this book came from Shriver's own children and nieces and nephews when her grandmother Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy died. She taught her family how to come together, feel closer to one another, and experience peace. (recommended)

The Southeastern Iowa Synod and Grand View University sponsored a service leadership event for high school youth **June 20-23, 2013 in Des Moines**. *Love Like Jesus* engaged close to 60 youth and adults from across the synod in leadership development, bible study, service outreach and worship.

Highlights include:

- *Great Bible Study!* – Professor Ken Jones of Grand View University served as our Teaching Pastor. Among many fascinating insights, he reminded the group that Jesus + Nothing = Salvation. We are free in Christ! It served as a great foundation for how we are able to Love Like Jesus in the world.
- *Love Like Jesus University* – Participants chose up to three sessions that provide integrated hands-on learning in Peer Ministry, art, music, recreation, theology and more!
- *Love Like Jesus Service Day* – Participants split into two groups to make a difference in the Des Moines Community. One group walked alongside clients of [Mosaic](#) as they prepared meals at [Meals from the Heartland](#), then washed vans and played games. The other group spent the day painting, cleaning and preparing teacher materials for [Cattell Elementary](#) in Des Moines.
- *ELCA World Hunger* – Justin Rabbach and Brittany Lamb from led an educational simulation game that sparked great discussion on the challenges for those who suffer from hunger and poverty in our local communities.
- *Worship* – Pastor Russ Lackey and Kate Gleney from the Campus Ministry office at Grand View University led the group in a variety of worship experiences. Music was provided by Ryan Buck and his band each evening. Bishop Michael Burk preached and presided at the closing worship serve held at Luther Memorial Church.

The weekend also included large group activities, small group discussions, youth worker training, time to nurture congregational relationships, and meaningful worship. Stewardship Spotlight

April 22 is Earth Day and so this seems like a good month to reflect on excerpts from the ELCA's Social Statement on "**Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice**", which was adopted by a more than two-thirds majority vote as a social statement of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America by the third Churchwide Assembly on August 28, 1993, at Kansas City, Missouri.

We of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America are deeply concerned about the environment, locally and globally, as members of this church and as members of society. Even as we join the political, economic, and scientific discussion, we know care for the earth to be a profoundly spiritual matter.

We see the despoiling of the environment as nothing less than the degradation of God's gracious gift of creation.

Humans, in service to God, have special roles on behalf of the whole of creation. Made in the image of God, we are called to care for the earth as God cares for the earth. God's command to have dominion and subdue the earth is not a license to dominate and exploit. Human dominion (Genesis 1:28; Psalm 8), a special responsibility, should reflect God's way of ruling as a shepherd king who takes the form of a servant (Philippians 2:7), wearing a crown of thorns.

According to Genesis 2:15, our role within creation is to serve and to keep God's garden, the earth. "To serve," often translated "to till," invites us again to envision ourselves as servants, while "to keep" invites us to take care of the earth as God keeps and cares for us (Numbers 6:24-26).

We are called to live according to God's wisdom in creation (Proverbs 8), which brings together God's truth and goodness. Wisdom, God's way of governing creation, is discerned in every culture and era in various ways. In our time, science and technology can help us to discover how to live according to God's creative wisdom.

Such caring, serving, keeping, loving, and living by wisdom sum up what is meant by acting as God's stewards of the earth. God's gift of responsibility for the earth dignifies humanity without debasing the rest of creation. We depend upon God, who places us in a web of life with one another and with all creation.

We join in the offertory prayer (Lutheran Book of Worship, page 109):
"Blessed are you, O Lord our God, maker of all things. Through your goodness you have blessed us with these gifts. With them we offer ourselves to your service and dedicate our lives to the care and redemption of all that you have made, for the sake of him who gave himself for us, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

FEBRUARY 10, 2014

Meeting called to order: 6:30 p.m.

Opening prayer and devotions: Deuteronomy 30: 15-20. Discussed ice-breakers, spare time, God Pause, choices. Noted that Dave Bahnsen celebrated a birthday and wedding anniversary. Prayers requests for: Pam, Marlene, Jeannette and Kim.

Pastor's report: Made 10 pastoral visits, attended Synod sponsored Racial Justice Workshop, met with 1 prospective new member family, pre-marital counseling, was pleased with Pulpit Exchange Sunday at Conservative Friends meeting, and Bishop Burk's visit to Bethany. We will host the ecumenical Ash Wednesday service on March 5. Pastor reminded council of the CTIM seminar in Cedar Rapids on March 8, and the Lutheran Day on the Hill visit to the Iowa State Capitol on March 10. Also is pleased with turnout for our inaugural Community Meal. Pastor will investigate opportunities for a council retreat.

Secretary's report: Minutes from February 9, 2014 meeting were moved for approval by Claudia Beyer, seconded by Courtney Heid. All ayes.

Treasurer's report: Gas and electricity bills are significantly higher due to continued cold spell. Offerings have been good. Kent Kaufman moved to approve the report, and Bonnie Conner seconded the move. Vote was all ayes.

Education report: Deposit has been paid to Camp Ewalu for our Vacation Bible School session this summer. Organization for the event is proceeding.

Missions: No report

Fellowship: Lenten dinners will be at 6:00 pm on Wednesdays, with Service following at 7pm. Various groups will fix and serve the meals.

Stewardship: No report

Youth: Discussion regarding another "Kids Against Hunger" packaging event.

Worship: No committee meetings due to weather. Some discussion about altar care meetings, and thoughts for Palm Sunday.

Building and Grounds: no report. Courtney Heid had suggestions regarding a wastebasket in the back of the sanctuary, reports that hand sanitizer needs refilling and asks about salt for steps/driveway.

Old Business:

- * Del continues to look into a person to resolve the Great Hall sound system. The quote for radon work in the small hall was in the range of \$1600.00 to \$2500.00, from Manley's Construction.
- * Sump pump pit in furnace room is filled with mud and needs to be fixed. John Black moved to approve doing the radon mitigation work, up to a \$2500.00 cost. Bonnie Conner seconded. All ayes.
- * Recovering of pews has gone well, finishing the choir pews is expected to happen around the middle of this month. A step up to the altar was repaired during this project also.
- * There have been 2 enquiries about the custodial position, but no actual applications.

New Business:

- * 4th Sunday dinners will continue. Food will be served from 5:30 to 6:30 pm. Discussed putting signs/banners up at Roth's, Town Hall and, Bethany. Candy suggested funding these through Cookie Walk funds. Pastor Chad suggested using the Bus Tour funds. Courtney Heid moved to use Bus Tour Funds for 4th Sunday Dinners, Bonnie Conner seconded. Vote passed.
- * The schools are possibly having a clothing drive with items to be contributed to our Closet. Pastor Chad will look into this and talk with High School principal.
- * Pastor Chad said this year's Backpack program for sending food home for the weekend with schoolchildren is working with 10 students. Last year this was funded through West Branch Area Religious Council and other community organizations. Candy Madsen moved to donate \$150.00 from Bethany for this program. Courtney Heid seconded, all ayes.
- * New member approval for Tim Shields and his children, Aidan and Miley; Katie Slama, Scott and Tara Langley, Tammie Urmie, and Greg and Katie Lipes. Moved by Bonnie Conner. Seconded by Candy Madsen. All ayes.
