Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Grace and peace to you from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! The verses above were part of our gospel lesson on July 8. In our modern world the command Jesus gives seems nearly impossible. How in the world could we survive without all our stuff? Is Jesus literally com-

manding us to do the same? That is, venture out to proclaim the good news of the kingdom by taking no bread, no bag, and no money. What do you think? How does the Holy Spirit speak to you in this passage?

There is no doubt Jesus continues to call us and send us to partner with him in carrying out the mission of God in the world. We do this in so many ways as the church together but also individually in our daily lives—at home in our families or at our places of employment. We can witness the good news of Jesus Christ anywhere we go through word but also through action. Jesus states "take nothing" and we really don't need anything. God has given everything we need in our human bodies. We have mouths and voices to tell about how Jesus is alive and active in the world and in our lives. We have legs to walk and go to our neighbor. We have hands to work alongside our neighbor in need and do God's work. We have arms to hold a brother or sister who is in pain. We have hearts to love just as God first loved us. Truly, we do have what we need.

However, this passage also makes me think at times I have too much that gets in my way of being the disciple of Christ I am called to be. Perhaps, Jesus is telling me to contemplate what limits my ability to serve him. You see, this passage has made me think what is it that I need to let go of in order to grow in my relationship with Jesus and more fully enter into the work he sends us all to do. So many things get in my way of doing God's work and fully experiencing the grace and love of Jesus Christ. For example, fear and jealousy. So many times I am fearful I don't have the right words to say or prayers to offer. Or I am jealous of my peers who seem so much more gifted in certain areas of ministry than I do. In doing this, I am not fully trusting God's call and that God's grace is sufficient. Therefore, perhaps a reading of this passage my be that Jesus tells us to let all that go and simply trust in him.

That is why I created a *Give it to God Box*. (Please see page 3 for a picture) During worship on the 8th everyone was invited to write something down that is getting in their way of more fully entering into a relationship with Jesus, or another brother or sister, or our baptismal vocation of doing God's work. This box is sealed shut so no one will look at your responses. It is now located on a table just outside of the kitchen and will remain there for a while. Continue to place those things you need to let go of in the box and in time we may recycle all of these trusting in God to create something new or perhaps we will burn this and let God bring new life through the ashes.

Books For Adults

This month we will continue the Baxter family series begun in the May newsletter. The Firstborn Series continues where the Redemption Series concluded. In the first book, Fame, Hollywood A- lister Dayne Matthews returns to Los Angeles after his shocking discovery in Reunion. Though his life is filled with fame, fortune, and paparazzi his heart is pull-

ing him toward a woman and a family who have no idea how their lives are tied to his. Meanwhile, Katy Hart has finally found contentment as the director of Christian Kids Theater in Bloomington, Indiana. That changes in an instant when she meets Dayne Matthews and he promises a future she left in her past.

In the second book, Forgiven, Dayne Matthews is working on what may his best movie yet. However, he feels empty and unfocused, aching for real love and the family he'll never know. Then a friend tells him about a teaching center and a way to become like God. Is this the answer he's been looking for? Back in Bloomington, Katy Hart struggles to walk the Christian Kids Theater group through a devastating tragedy, and John Baxter reconnects with an old friend and shares a buried secret.

In book three, Found, John Baxter, driven by his wife's dying wish, sets out to find their firstborn son. Meanwhile, Dayne Matthews receives crushing news and finds wisdom and comfort from a long-lost friend and then Katy Hart, the girl Dayne can't seem to forget. In book four, Family, in the wake of finding his firstborn son, John Baxter, looks for a way to tell his other children the truth about the secret he's kept from them all their lives. At the same time, a sensational Hollywood trial brings Dayne Matthews and Katy Hart together again, this time in a very public way. In the midst of doubts and presumed scandals, it is clear that family has never been more important.

In book five, Forever, Katy Hart is thrilled about her future with Hollywood's Dayne Matthews. As she plans a wedding and looks for a house she receives tragic news. She and the Baxter family must travel to Los Angeles to sort through their options. While paparazzi hound them, Luke Baxter wrestles with feelings that have troubled him for nearly a year. Ultimately, the Baxter's must pull together one last time in an act of service and love.



A Loving Bond for Landon

Seven years ago, Ashley was eager to welcome her first child, Landon. While Landon was a perfectly behaved newborn, Ashley began feeling overwhelmed when his behavior changed as he grew.

Landon stopped napping. He began throwing tantrums and lashed out when Ashley tried to help him. Ashley was desperate for a relationship with her toddler, but Landon always pushed her away. She turned to LSI's Behavioral Health Intervention Services.

Peggy, Landon's LSI worker, began visiting their home to help Landon develop the coping skills he needed to control his anger and guide him back to being the happy child he once was.

Peggy and Landon began taking walks together, visiting the library, and playing games. When the family moved to a new home, Peggy made sure Landon was comfortable in his room and encouraged him to use it as a safe space when he needed to be alone.

Peggy and Landon have been working together for years and Landon, now 7, knows he has a support system to turn to on the rough days.

"We would truly be lost without Peggy," Ashley says. "Now Landon gives hugs, lets me know when he's angry and – the biggest gift of all – I occasionally hear, 'I love you, Mom'."



SOUTHEASTERN IOWA SYNOD ASSEMBLY RECAP


Below is a summary of the 2018 Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly held this past May. Bethany's voting members in attendance were Alan Beyer and Laura Twing. Should you have any questions please see Al, Laura or Pastor Chad.

The 31st Assembly of the Southeastern Iowa Synod was held May 18 and 19, 2018, at the Marriott Hotel and Conference Center Coralville, Iowa.

Over 400 voting members and visitors gathered around the theme "The Water and The Witness." Mikka McCracken, Director of Planning and Engagement with ELCA World Hunger served as the churchwide representative providing updates and stories of the work we do together as the ELCA. Bishop Julian Gordy of the Southeastern Synod shared of our connections throughout the nation and in ministry. The primary business of this year's assembly was action on the Synod Governance Proposal and subsequent election of synod council members, the synod nominating committee, the synod consultation committee, and synod discipline committee, as well as several resolutions. As well as election of voting members to the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. Bishop Michael Burk presided over the assembly, including the Friday evening service of Holy Communion. In his report, Bishop Burk provided highlights of our shared ministry since we last gathered in assembly, providing his assessment of ways we share in "The Water and the Witness" talking about congregational vitality and outreach. Additionally, there was an interactive learning center event on Friday afternoon which allowed assembly participants to learn about partner ministries like Lutheran Services in Iowa, Bread for the World, Peace not Walls, ELCA World Hunger, and more. There were prayer activities, artistic expression and advocacy work. 354 voting members and 56 visitors were in attendance for elections, business matters and resolutions. 56% of voting members were lay voting members, 62% of those were female and 38% male. Positions elected were Synod Secretary, members of the Synod Council, members continued... of the Synod Nominating Committee, members of the Synod Consultation and Disciple Committees, and representatives to the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. Resolutions adopted included: 1) Memorial on the 50th anniversary of the ordination of women: a resolution encouraging those in the Southeastern lowa Synod and beyond to recognize, celebrate and memorialize the contributions of ordained women. 2) Peace not walls: a resolution encouraging the synod to memorialize and urge the 2019 Churchwide Assembly and elected officials petitioning for changes in due process, and U.S. foreign aid to protect children. 3) Preventing gun violence, a resolution encouraging individuals and congregations to address issues of gun violence in worship, education, and public discourse. 4) A courtesy resolution of thanksgiving for the assembly and various ministries of the Southeastern Iowa Synod. Visit the www. seiasynod.org/assembly for the full text of resolutions. Other business included the approval of the 2019 synod budget and minimum compensation guidelines. Congregations and rostered leaders celebrating anniversaries were celebrated. The

synod assembly offering, a culmination of the "The Water and The Witness" buckets project was designated to water related ministries of the ELCA. The meeting opened with prayer by Pastor Chad. Pastor's Report: Pastor Chad left an extended report. It was a busy month. He mentioned the council meeting at the Synod Office and discussions with Bishop Burk. The annual council retreat was April 21st. He made 12 pastoral visits in the past month. Confirmation will wrap up this week. Pastor has been accepted into a leadership school held June 3-8 at a Retreat Center in Hiawatha. Along with Jill and Al, he attended worship service at Anamosa State Prison on May 5th. Upcoming events are Synod Assembly on May 18-19th. Confirmation is next Sunday. Pastor discussed a consideration of tithing in response to a large contribution given to the church. Money is available in the Mission Investment Fund if we identify a project or need in the community.

Secretary's Report: Jamie moved and Cheryl seconded to approve the March minutes as corrected. Motion carried. Jamie moved and Linda seconded to approve the April minutes. Motion carried. Jamie moved and Wayne seconded to approve the minutes of the special congregational meeting on May 13th. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: April revenues were \$16,231 81. This was up considerably from last month and in line with last year's revenues. Expenditures were \$13,570.52. Linda moved and Wayne seconded to approve the treasurer's report. Motion carried.

Building and Grounds Committee: Jamie said the parsonage water broke down and was replaced. The clothes washer and kitchen stove also broke down and are being replaced. These are being donated. A work session was held last Sunday following service to clean up outside the church. Last week he sprayed the landscape around the church for weeds.

Education: Tonya Darla, and Amber met to make Vacation Bible School plans. It will be June 11th through the 14th. It is open for the community and plans are being made for about 40 kids. The last session will be on Thursday and no program will be held at the end. They are planning a Food Pantry project for outreach. The last Wednesday program for Sunday School will be held this week.

Evangelism: No report

Fellowship: 4th Sunday Meal will not be held in May due to Memorial Day and graduation. It has been rescheduled for June 10th, at the beginning of Bible School. The next planned 4th Sunday meal will be on July 22nd. Sunday morning fellowship is going well. Plans are being made to invite Ugandan Thunder back this fall.


