Dear People of God,

Grace and peace to you from the light of the world, Jesus Christ our Lord! Amen.

"Come, follow me." Three short and simple words that Jesus issues to his first disciples in the gospel of Mark. It seems so darn easy and

in fact Mark's presentation of how these first disciples respond further seems to imply that's all there is to it. They just drop everything they are doing. They abandon their fishing boats and follow Jesus. They leave all they have ever known and get behind him. Two of the disciples even leave their father who had also been in the boat with them. "Come, follow me" and they do without question and not knowing where the journey they embark on will lead them.

I have been pondering this text even following preaching on it January 21<sup>st</sup>. It is one that just seems to live at the front of my brain nudging me, even nagging me to continue to wrestle with it. God's word is like that sometimes. In one sense, I absolutely love the call stories of these first disciples because Jesus, the Son of God, invites these ordinary, everyday fishermen to join him and the work God has sent him to do. Likewise, we too are invited into his ministry. Just as we are. Ordinary. Everyday. People. We are good enough just as God created us! We have the gifts Jesus can use to fish for people and to bear forth light to the world!

On the other hand, we know what those first disciples didn't know when they first got behind Jesus. Following Jesus and being his disciples is a daunting task and will take us places we would rather not go such as the cross of Good Friday. It will call us to do things that very well might make us uncomfortable—forgiving our enemies. Excuse me, I don't think so Jesus. Offering forgiveness seventy times seven, which basically equates to Jesus saying we are to forgive to the point it can't be counted or measured. Yeah! Sure thing, Jesus. Or maybe it's selling everything we have and giving it to the poor. No way, no how, it's not going to happen Jesus!

Here is the rub with this text for me. Mark makes it look so darned easy but I know it's just not that simple and I suspect you do as well. Those days when fear sets in and I don't want to invite someone to Bethany for the possibility of being rejected or those days when its scary to try something new or perhaps it was the unknown and uneasiness I felt last week going to Anamosa State Penitentiary to undergo training so that at some point I will be able to worship with the inmates and brothers and sisters in Christ of the newest congregation in our Synod called Free Indeed. (More information on page 8)

Yet, in the back of my mind is that voice of the Good Shepherd whispering, "Come, follow me." He will lead. He has and will go ahead of us. We won't be alone. He will give us the strength. He will show us the way. He will equip us. In all we do as people of God whether corporately as the church or individually in our daily lives the call of Jesus continues with three simple, short words, "Come, follow me."

## **Bethany Books**

#### **Books For Adults**

This month's theme will be fiction once again. Last June I put a number of books by Lauraine Snelling on display. The first book this month is a new one by her. It is book one of a new series titled *The Promise Of Dawn*. A new family emigrates from Norway but they do not go to Blessing, North Dakota but to Minnesota. Opportunities are scarce in Norway, so when Rune and Signe Carlson

receive a letter from Rune's uncle, Einer Strand, offering to loan them money for passage to America, Rune accepts. Signe is reluctant to leave her home, especially as she is pregnant with her fourth child. Einer promises to give them land of their own, something they could never afford in Norway. Life in Minnesota is more difficult than they imagined. Uncle Einer and Aunt Gerd are hard, demanding people. They soon find themselves worked to the bone to pay off their debt. Have a good time reading this book to find out what happens with this family.

In September, I introduced several books by Beverly Lewis. She has since been busy writing more books about the Amish community. In *The Atonement* we meet Lucy Flaud, now twenty-five and beyond Amish courting age. The mistakes of the past haunt her and she is constantly striving to be good enough, filling up her hours doing volunteer work. No matter what she does she does feel she is doing enough. When her father strikes up an unexpected friendship with an Englischer in search of a simpler life, Lucy forms a connection of her own with him. Meanwhile, she rejects courtship with her longtime Amish friend. Is it too late for her to accept redemption for what is bothering her and directing her behavior?

In *The Wish* Leona Speicher got he "sister" she always dreamed of when Gloria Gingerich and her family moved to Lancaster. The Arkansas newcomers seem to be the answer to Leona's prayers. She and Gloria form a close friendship and are virtually inseparable. This continues until Gloria's father is expelled from their Old Order Amish church for reasons no one will discuss. Much to Leona's dismay, the Gingerich's suddenly pack up and disappear. After several years of silence, Gloria unexpectedly contacts Leona. Leona makes up her mind to go after her friend and bring her back, despite some who question if this move is a good idea. Will this move be her undoing with the Amish community?

In *The Proving* we meet Amanda Dienner. Five years before something happened that caused her to leave her Amish community. After five years as an Englischer, she is shocked to learn that her mother has passed away. Her mother left her Lancaster County's most popular Amish bed-and-breakfast. However, the inn will only truly be hers if she can successfully run it for twelve months. Reluctantly, she accepts the challenge, even though it means facing the family she left behind. What caused her to leave? Also the clientele expect an Amish hostess. Can she do that? What about her problems in the kitchen trying to cook? Can she fulfill the terms of the inheritance or is it one big mistake?

#### **Book For Children**

Buzby: The Misbehaving Bee by Troy Schmidt is based on characters from Max Lucado's Hermie: A Common Caterpillar. Buzby thinks he is too cool for rules. Ladybug twins Hailey and Bailey admire him for it. That is, until he lets a huge frog into the garden, putting everyone at risk. He finally must ask God for forgiveness and help. #### **Healing through Harmony**

Jaden doesn't have many memories of his father.

When Jaden was 5 years old, his father unexpectedly passed away. Now 14. Jaden has grown up without that loving connection. Through his grief, his connection to his mother became strained, and he struggled to manage his anger at home. After being placed in LSI's Bremwood Residential Treatment Center in Waverly, Jaden connected with LSI's Spiritual Life program. The voluntary program connects youth with faith-based art, music, and film. It serves as a safe space for children to open up about their emotions and get the support they need to thrive. "Jaden is one of the few kids who would actively set up lunch appointments with me," says Pastor Dennis Bauer, who leads the program. "He's really benefitted from being able to talk during the day." Having access to a support network and a trusting relationship with Pastor Dennis has helped Jaden feel empowered to make a positive change during his time at Bremwood. Jaden is finding his faith through music, and he's learning how to talk about his trauma and become a role model for other lowa youth. Jaden has now been adopted into a loving family. As he finishes up his treatment at Bremwood, his family visits frequently and worships with him, and Jaden is enjoying being a new big brother.

Greetings Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As the acting Treasurer of the West Branch Area Religious Council (WBARC) I want to once again thank all of you for your faithful partnership and support of our shared ministry together. Through your faithful stewardship and monetary donations to our joint account we were able to continue our shared mission in assisting those in need in our community.

During 2017 WBARC received \$1,483 in monetary gifts. Thank you all so much! We had mission expenditures of \$2437.23. During 2017 we assisted approximately 17 individuals and/or families with needs such as a room at the Presidential Inn, food vouchers to Jack and Jill, fuel assistance, rental assistance, deposit to provide safe housing in a domestic violence situation, shoes for a student, and a few other needs. Additionally, WBARC continued its strong support of the Weekend Backpack Program at Hoover Elementary, which provides weekend food items for students who may need them, by allocating \$1,050 to fund this valuable ministry and hopefully we will be able to continue to do so once again in 2018.

Once again, on behalf of my colleagues, let me express our gratitude and thankfulness for your commitment and faithfulness to our shared ministry. We do our best to faithfully steward these gifts and see they are making a difference and extending God's care and love to all. We look forward to 2018, our partnership together, and our joint efforts in doing God's work in our community.

## **Opening Prayer and Devotional** (Pastor Chad)

Pastor Chad led with an opening prayer.

New Business (All)-Due to scheduling issues New Business was moved to the front of the agenda November Budget

Discussed disposition of \$345.91 in the noisy can collection without action. Stewardship and Youth will decide action in 2018.

#### **2018 Budget**

Initial budget planning spend versus inbound revenue was projected at approximately \$3,500. This is only a two percent variance on a large (\$145,000) projected budget. This gap is likely to be covered with excess carryover from 2017.

Beth Kaufman moves to approve budget. Jon Twing seconds. Motion approved.

Special Gifts Budget

Need to give away the remainder of the Thrivent money since Thrivent changed funding programs. This is an additional \$227 that needs to be distributed in the budget.

Jamie Zimmerman made a motion to move \$500 from the "internal missions" to the quilters with the balance of the 1.5% to a new fund called "internal ministries". Beth Kaufman seconded the motion. Motion carried.

The Council agreed to allocate money to the "external ministries" using a lot process. First, the Council agreed to add the Prison Ministry to the roster of "external ministries." Second, the Council agreed to cut the WBARC allocation in half due to need (i.e., WBARC finances are solid). Finally, the Council agreed that if the entire budget represented 15 shares, WBARC would get one share and all others would get two shares of budget allocation. This resulted in the following distribution of total budget allocation (i.e., basis of 2.5%):

## FREE INDEED PRISON MINISTRY

Free Indeed is a new ministry taking shape at the Anamosa State Penitentiary, a men's state prison located in Anamosa. Free Indeed is a community that shares the good news of Jesus Christ with and through those inside the prison walls, with support of ministry partners outside the prison walls. Currently, Free Indeed is a congregation under development in the Southeastern Iowa Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Free Indeed will serve the nearly 1,000 men living at the Anamosa State Penitentiary with the mission to share the good news of Jesus Christ to those who are inside and outside of prison walls, build a community of faith within the confines of the prison using national Prison Congregations of American model, build a network of supporters on the outside of the prison walls to support and participate in the congregation and assist those who are released to be restored to the community and to continue in their spiritual journey. Pastor Jerry Collell has been called to this congregation and will be worshipping with us on March 11 and sharing more about this ministry, which Bethany has supported financially the last 2 years.
