At the beginning of this month I once again had the opportunity to attend Lutheran Day on the Hill. This is an annual event sponsored by Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI). For those of you who don't know, LSI has been in

existence for 150 years and throughout these years they have been providing human services to people of all ages across the state of Iowa. Their services span a wide range from therapy and intensive crisis intervention with families; to residential treatment for children and teens, to community support for people of refugee status and people with disabilities. Lutheran Day on the Hill is a dedicated day that pastors and members of Lutheran churches across Iowa gather in Des Moines to learn about LSI, spend time in prayer, and then head to the State Capitol to advocate on behalf of LSI and other non-profit agencies who do so much for the people of Iowa; especially, those most in need.

Each year when the fliers start to come I quickly think maybe this year I will pass. After all, it is during Lent and I have plenty of other things going on. I really don't need to waste an entire day going over and back and further, will my voice even make a difference? That is an easy mindset to get into. Yet, I think back upon past years and know that our voices do matter. It is exciting to see a huge group of folks decked out in our blue shirts blanketing the insides of the State House. People can't help but notice us and stare at our shirts to see what they say. As I look back and reflect I only wish I would have had this opportunity sooner in life. One of the guest speakers prior to our trip to the Capitol was Pastor Dan Rift, director of ELCA World Hunger and Disaster Appeal. In his presentation he said, "We give faith voice in many different ways." One of those ways is by advocating on behalf of our neighbors who are in need.

That day we gave faith voice by gathering together as the church, wearing our blue shirts, and conversing with our elected officials about issues that pertained to protecting the most vulnerable in our society. Yes, they knew we were Lutheran by our shirts and that many of us were pastors yet in our conversations we didn't use "God" or "Jesus" language but we did proclaim the gospel in acting for justice, loving kindness, and walking humbly with our God. If you have never contacted your elected officials I encourage you to do so via phone, email, or in person if you get the chance. If you don't know who your state officials are simply go to www.legis.iowa.gov/ legislators/find and search by city, zip code, or address.

There are many ways we give faith voice and I am grateful for the ways each of you do so that are many and varied. Thank God for all you do and know that it does matter. It is part of our calling and who we are as a people of God. And next year, I truly hope you consider attending and ride the charter bus over to the State Capitol, have a spot of lunch in the Capitol, and maybe just have some fun in the process. If you are nervous or feel you won't know what to say, don't worry because we visit our officials in a group and the first year you can simply observe.

A New Parenting Path

When Kalee became a young mom in high school, she knew exactly what kind of parent she *didn*'t want to be.

"My childhood was very different," she said. "There was a lot of miscommunication on all levels and yelling all the time. I had a lot of trouble growing up, and I didn't want my kids to go through that."

Instead, Kalee and her partner Shane are finding their own parenting style, thanks to some support from LSI's Families Together program. Families Together is a voluntary home visitation program that offers families parenting education, community resources, support and more.

"Kalee and Shane are so much fun to work with," said Gaylene, an LSI caseworker. "They are very good parents. They just needed a little more confidence in their skills."

For example, the family learned new communication tips to use with their son Gabe, age 4.

"Before we started the program, Shane and I fought a lot about different parenting styles," Kalee said. "We would get frustrated when we couldn't get Gabe to understand what we wanted him to do. We learned how to talk to him better, and now we're on the same page."

Through Families Together, LSI can partner with families at any time from before their child is born up to age 18. On average, an LSI caseworker will meet with a family for 10 - 12 months. That approach, which builds trust and relationships, is comforting, Kalee said.

"Gaylene feels like a part of our family," Kalee said. "Gabe always asks when she's coming. Having her here also helped prepare Gabe for school."

Kalee hopes her two children will grow up happier than she was, she said.

"I don't think it will be as much of a struggle for them to succeed," she said. "They will feel more secure and loved than I felt growing up."

Books For Adults

The Great Reformer: Francis and the making of a Radical Pope by Austen Ivereigh is a biography that gives the reader a good insight into what has made Pope Francis the person he is and where he is taking the Catholic Church. He is the first pope from the Western Hemisphere and is a symbol of the shift of church membership away from Europe to other parts of the globe. The first part of the book tells of his growing up in Argentina and his early years as a Jesuit priest. There is more history of Argentina than one usually reads but

it helps one to understand the environment that shaped him. He proved to be an excellent administrator but he had a vocation rooted in pastoral ministry among the poorest people. This later is a key in understanding his beliefs and actions. It also explains how he came to become pope. He has gained tremendous attention and appears to not believe in business as usual. This book gives insight into where he might be leading the Catholic Church. (member recommended)

Do you wonder why other people do not think the same as you do on matters of religion or politics? Today, in America, we seen to be so divided especially on the political scene. What seems obvious to one is quite contrary to another. The same ideas mean different things to different people. Sometimes it feels as if half the population is living in a different moral universe. *The Righteous Mind: Why Good People Are Divided By Politics And Religion* by Jonathan Haidt seeks to answer this question. Haidt shows how moral judgments come not from reason but from intuition. This book will help to understand your friends, enemies and fellow citizens. (member recommended)

Understanding Jesus by Stephen M. Miller is a guide to his life and times. Often we do not get the full meaning of what Jesus says or does because we do not fully understand the context in which it takes place. The book gives insights into ancient Jewish customs from birth to burial. New and important meanings are presented that typically not been considered before.

A second book by Stephen M. Miller, *Who's Who & Where's Where In The Bible 2.0* is an illustrated A-to-Z dictionary of the people and places in the bible. This is a handy reference written in everyday language, to help in understanding the bible.

Chicken Soup For The Soul: Messages From Heaven by Jack Canfield, Mark Victor Hansen, and Amy Newmark is another book in the *Chicken Soup* series. It is a collection of "101 stories of signs from beyond, amazing connections and love that does not die". (donated)

This month's book is *Timothy Grows In God's Word* by Carolyn Bergt. This book tells about Timothy as a baby, a boy, and a man. God helped Timothy grow in many ways and children can grow also when they hear God's word. (donated)
