So many of us have been pondering these last four and a half months. So much has changed in our lives, workplaces and in the church. We have experienced a variety of emotions, highs and lows. Yet, grief is one I seldom let control me anymore. At least, grief associated with COVID-19 and the inability to do so many of the "normal" things of life prior to the onset of this virus. The above verse, as well as others, have helped transform that grief into hope, excitement, and eyes to see God is doing something new and all these "new" things and changes this virus has forced us to do are working together for good.

Several years ago on a family vacation to Orange Beach, Alabama, which is located right on the Gulf Coast of Mexico we encountered less than ideal weather. A tropical depression had set in shortly after our arrival bringing with it heavy rains. We waited it out a few days but realized our chances of getting some quality sun and surf time was minimal. Our online worship opportunities have reached many people who would otherwise not come through the doors of our building. We are exploring other ways we continue to be church together in this time. There is excitement in watching the Spirit work and transform the grief, challenges, and disappointments we all experienced early on into new opportunities for growth and life in Christ! Books For Adults

The author for this month's books is Jennifer Beckstrand. Most of the books that we have that deal with the Amish community take place in Pennsylvania. There are Amish communities in many other states as well including several in Iowa. This series takes place in Wisconsin. The main characters are three sisters who live with an aunt. They have hives with which to raise honey as a source of income. They are known as the Honeybee Sisters which is the name of the series of three books.

Each book features one of the three Christner girls. Aunt Bitsy (Hyacinth) came to live with the girls when their parents were killed in a car accident. She had left the Amish community and lived in the outside/non Amish world for twenty years. She is quite a colorful character and not your typical Amish woman. She colored her hair and had a fondness for long earrings (worn inside the house). She looked after the girls physical needs, raised them, and kept them from boys/men. While the girls: Lily, Poppy, and Rose are sisters their personalities are each very different from the other.

The first book in the series is *Sweet As Honey*. Lily, the oldest sister, is the focal point of this book. Lily went through the awkward teenage years. She is an example of the *Ugly Duckling* story. When she was in 8th grade she needed glasses, braces, had pimples and the rest. Boys called her names and she was traumatized to think that she was plain and not much to look at even though she has moved beyond that stage. She was the intellectual of the group who liked to read and kept the farm account books. This volume traces her finally accepting herself.

In the second book of the series, *A Bee In her Bonnet*, Poppy, the middle daughter, is emphasized. She is an independent, determined individual. She has been outrunning boys and standing up for picked on children since she was a younger girl. Poppy felt that it was her job to protect her sisters. Many a day in school she would punch or shove a boy who bothered her sisters. She thinks that because of her personality she will become an "old maid" but events prove otherwise.

Rose, the youngest daughter, was like a delicate flower. She is the feature of the third book, *Like A Bee To Honey*. She was timid, virtually afraid of her own shadow. She was most affected by her parent's death, being only five years old at the time. She also was involved in a case of childhood trauma. For years she did not talk to anyone. She was like a scared little mouse who did not interact much with anyone beyond her sisters. She was good with animals

and bees and small children. She would not talk to boys or men. When events involving a local young man and also a vandal who has been targeting the Honeybee Farm and eventually Rose bring about change. This book, as well as the others, shows the need to forgive oneself as well as others.



Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI) News

School is right around the corner! This year's back-to-school time feels a little different than usual for all of us, but imagine what it would be like to be a child or teen with an emotional or behavioral disorder. For the last several months, their routine has been turned upside-down and they've learned to adjust to a new way of life. Moving back into a school year structure can be particularly stressful and it can be difficult to concentrate and cope.

Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI) provides mental health services to children and families across the state. It's our job to relate to children who might feel alone or misunderstood. Our therapists provide virtual telehealth therapy sessions with children while our Behavioral Health Intervention Services team collaborates with families virtually or in a community setting to help them develop skills like anger management and healthy decision-making. LSI also provides 24-hour mental health care at the Bremwood and Beloit Residential Treatment Centers in Waverly and Ames to empower Iowa's most vulnerable children and teens.

We are Still Here: LSI's Therapy Services

When LSI's workforce began working remote as a COVID-19 precaution, therapist Andrea knew she would need to adjust to a new way of providing therapy to the clients she serves.

In particular, one individual she met with struggled with anxiety on a daily basis. With the pandemic, however, her anxiety deepened and she spiraled to levels she hadn't encountered in years. And she was afraid she would no longer be able to see Andrea and receive the weekly therapy she'd relied on.

But that wasn't stopping Andrea. She set up a home office where she could provide telehealth virtual therapy sessions to all her clients in need of the same consistent care they were used to. Andrea used this time to work with her client on self-care strategies, coping skills, and mindfulness to help her client stay grounded when she felt anxious.

Andrea's client now has the tools she needs to handle the difficult days through this crisis, and Andrea is able to continue providing life-changing serves to lowa children, adults, and families in her community.

BETHANY LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES—June 8, 2020

The meeting was called to order by President Hughes at 6:35 p.m.

Members present :Dave Bahnsen, Linda Black, Nancy Bruns, Anne Fetzer, Del Hughes, Amber Marsh, Kristin McElhinney, and Pastor Chad.

Members absent: Alan Beyers and Curt Casper.

Pastor Chad led devotions centered on how the church is called to act: to strive and work for justice and peace. He asked the council to reflect upon church signage and a statement on behalf of our congregation to respond to the happenings in our nation stemming from systemic racism and death of George Floyd.

Dave presented a sign that was brought to council last year. Upon further discussion, it was agreed upon that the signage reflects our church's message. Dave researched the cost and a 8'x4' banner costs \$125. Pastor Chad and Linda mentioned placing the banner by the evergreen trees and burning bushes. Dave motioned to purchase the Be the Church banner and Amber seconded. Motion passed.

Pastor Chad asked the council for statements for the council/congregation's response on systematic racism to be included in a joint statement with the WBARC. He shared his three statements: there has been complacency in the past, that we name racism as a sin, and we proclaim God's love for all. Amber added that we should be moving forward: that we know better, so we do better. Pastor Chad asked the council to email him any other feedback or statements.

Dave moved and Amber seconded to accept the Pastor's Report. Motion passed.

Secretary's Report:

Two reports were submitted: the regular May meeting minutes and the Executive meeting notes for May. The following corrections were asked:

Executive Meeting Notes- May 20

1) Line B, First bullet point: Jill has been fully compensated for church accompaniment and choir. As of June 1st, she will be paid for service only, as the choir does not meet in summer months.

May 2020 Council Meeting Notes

1) Old Business, First bullet point: Some long-term planning for in-person services is being made. The council and executive committee are now deciding every two weeks on whether or not to remain closed. Some guidelines from the Synod Office are being used.

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2) New Business, First bullet point: A task force is being set up to discuss outreach opportunities for Bethany and gathering for inperson services possibilities.

Linda moved to accept the secretary's report as amended. Anne seconded. Motion passed.

Treasurer's Report:

Nancy reported that Bethany had received \$15,305 in offerings, which brings our year to date offering near the budgeted amount and slightly more than this time last year. We received a refund of our Synod Assembly registrations, which is reflected as a negative expense of \$720, although it is assumed we will pay a portion of that later in August. Expenditures in May totaled \$11,075, which allowed for a net increase of \$4,229 in the General Fund.

Anne moved to accept the treasurer's report. Amber seconded. Motion passed.

Committee Reports

Building and Grounds: No report.

Evangelism and Outreach: No report.

Stewardship: Nothing new to report from Dave.

Fellowship:

- Anne reported that two virtual fellowship gatherings over Zoom have occurred, with about 10-12 people. They participated in ice breakers, games, and had great conversations. They have lasted from 30-45 minutes in length.
- It has had a positive response and there are plans to continue virtual fellowship. It is scheduled through the end of June and can be extended, if needed.

Worship and Music:

- Linda said that Patsy gave a financial donation that was used to purchase a vacuum cleaner for our church. Linda mentioned that Patsy commented that the church has done a lot for her and she wanted to do this for Bethany.
- The courtyard has been sprayed for weeds but will need mulch to keep weeds at bay. Del will bring it up to Curt.

Education & Youth:

- Kristin said a surprise gift basket was made and delivered to each of our graduating high school seniors. Pastor Chad included a card and candle w/verse & prayer, and the baskets also had several other gifts and snacks. Pastor Chad recognized seniors during online worship service on Sunday, May 24.
- Plans are being made for a family movie project this summer- deliver popcorn & snacks, provide movie title selections and include discussion questions, devotions, etc. for our Faith Formation families.

Old Business:

- We discussed the possibility of giving a monetary gift towards/in honor of Bishop Burk's retirement. Dave motioned to donate \$100 towards Bishop Burk's Appreciation Fund. Kristin second. Motion passed.
- In-person worship guidelines, written by Bethany's task force committee, were read and discussed. The presented guidelines are for how the church will operate for in-person services, but do not specify when in-person services will occur. Dave expressed the importance that it should be clear to congregational members that they should use their best judgment on when to return to church and not feel pressured. Pastor Chad explained there will be a letter that accompanies the guidelines that will give the congregation this message, in addition to other safety precautions that the church is taking. Anne expressed concern that the proposed guidelines take away from what church provides to its members. Del and Pastor Chad shared the importance of using data and recommendations from trusted medical sources to make decisions. Nancy motioned to accept the task force's recommendations for in-person worship services and Kristin seconded. Motion passed with one abstained vote.

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New Business:

- Pastor Chad reached out about having a graduation open house for Matt outdoors on the parsonage lot. Upon discussion, the council did not feel there was a need for council to vote on this and that Pastor Chad has discretion on how to use the parsonage lot.
- Pastor Chad presented family health insurance information, as part of his compensation package, for the council to review and consider. The council requested time to review the information and discuss it at the next Council meeting. Amber motioned to table the discussion for the next Council meeting and Linda seconded. Motion passed.
- It was discussed that gathering for in-person worship services and extending the church physical building closure from June 15 should be extended to July 1. Several council members brought up the importance to follow our Bishop's (and ELCA) recommendations for reopening/closure of church services. Dave mentioned that as Lutherans, we do hold the power to make the best decision for congregation, using the recommendations, as we feel necessary. Linda brought up the discussion of having an outdoor service when inperson worship resumes. Del highlighted from our conversation that our first efforts when reestablishing in-person services are: outside services, then great hall services, followed by sanctuary service. The need for online worship was identified as strong and the council expressed desire to continue online worship. even after in-person services resume (in whatever format that may be). Amber motioned to extend the closure of in-person gatherings to no sooner than July 1st and continue with online services. Nancy seconded. Motion passed.

Anne moved to adjourn the meeting. Linda seconded. Motion passed.

Meeting was closed with prayer. Next meeting: July 13, 2020

Bethany Lutheran Church Special Council Meeting June 28, 2020

President Hughes called the Zoom meeting to order at 6:05 p.m.

Members present: Del Hughes, Linda Black, Nancy Bruns, Kristin McElhinney, Amber Marsh, Dave Bahnsen, Anne Fetzer, Alan Beyer, and Pastor Whaley.

Pastor Chad opened the meeting with prayer.

Business agenda:

- Outdoor services: Del mentioned the recent increase in COVID-19 cases in the area so is hesitant to have the congregation gather in person. Anne suggested planning an outdoor service for July 19th, which can be cancelled if needed. More discussion followed a suggestion by Kristin to have a congregational survey about when people feel comfortable with services as we have now, or when would they like to again gather together. The decision on a survey will be tabled for now, waiting for the number of COVID cases to decrease. It was agreed to do a tentative outdoor service on July 19th, with a final decision on this made at our next council meeting. Pastor mentioned and Dave commented on the possibility of using an FM frequency to broadcast the service so people could remain in their cars.
- By tradition, the regular council meeting in July is cancelled. But, due to circumstances, our next council meeting will be held as usual, at 6:30 p.m. on July 13th.
- Statement from WBARC: Pastor Chad read a statement from WBARC as the West Branch churches' response to racism. All agreed with the statement. Del mentioned that the ELCA statement on this topic was very similar. This will be sent for publication to the West Branch Times, Tipton Conservative, Iowa City Press Citizen, and Cedar Rapids Gazette.

The meeting adjourned at 6:41 p.m. with the Lord's Prayer.

Outdoor Gathering Guidelines

Please stay home if experiencing any symptoms associated with COVID-19 including: cough, fever, shortness of breath, chills, fatigue, muscle or body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea, vomiting or diarrhea. (cdc.gov)

Additionally, please remain home if you have been in contact with anyone with a confirmed COVID-19 diagnosis within the last 14 days.

- Sanitize hands
- · Face mask required age 2 and older
 - Only exception for those who may have trouble breathing with mask, then shield acceptable form of PPE
- Stay at least 6 feet apart from others outside immediate family
- No singing
- Softly humming hymns and quietly speaking congregational responses permitted
- Bring own chair and refreshment
- Gloves not recommended
- It is encouraged those most vulnerable, including those with preexisting medical conditions and older than 65 continue to "limit their activities outside the home." (Governor's May 20 Proclamation)

Following the tragic death of George Floyd on May 25th and the continuing sin of racism that infects our society, the West Branch Area Religious Council through much discussion, prayer, and reflection issued a statement in response (see below), which was approved by the leadership teams of each representative congregation.

As a faith community, members of West Branch Area Religious Council unequivocally state racism is not a thing of the past or simply a throwaway political issue to be bandied about when convenient. We recognize that the legacy of white supremacy remains a systemic element of our institutions and our culture as a nation, and we must confront racism in ourselves and in the institutions we care about. It is a real and present danger that must be met head on.

Because we serve a God of love, mercy, and justice, racism – a mix of power, privilege, and prejudice- is a violation of God's intention for humanity. Like the peaceful protestors, we must build justice in order to achieve peace. It is time to use our voices, our pens, our feet and our hearts for change.

New Trees

Two new trees were planted near the church parking lot recently and two more were planted in the parsonage. These trees were part of our stewardship of creation in replacing trees that have been taken out for the resurfacing of the church lot or we have been forced to remove at the parsonage due to disease. The trees near the church lot were do-

This professional development program provides pastors critical support, promotes innovative strategies, and engages them in ongoing learning and opportunities for renewal.
