

#### WORD

God speaks to us in scripture reading, preaching, and song.

## FIRST READING: Isaiah 40:1-11

In grand, flowing, poetic lines, the prophet announces that the exile of God's people in Babylon is over. God will deliver Israel and will care for her as a shepherd cares for the sheep. This word can be trusted, because the only enduring reality in life is the word of God.

A reading from Isaiah.

<sup>1</sup>Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. <sup>2</sup>Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the LORD's hand double for all her sins. <sup>3</sup>A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD, make straight in the desert a highway for our God.

<sup>4</sup>Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. <sup>5</sup>Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all

people shall see it together, for the mouth of the LORD has spoken." <sup>6</sup>A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field.

<sup>7</sup>The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the LORD blows upon it; surely the people are grass. <sup>8</sup>The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand forever. <sup>9</sup>Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!"

<sup>10</sup>See, the Lord God comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him. <sup>11</sup>He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep.

# **PSALM 85:1-2, 8-13**

Psalm 85 is a liturgy and prayer for help.

- <sup>1</sup>You have been gracious to your land, O LORD; you have restored the good fortune of Jacob.
- <sup>2</sup>You have forgiven the iniquity of your people and blotted out all their sins.
- <sup>8</sup>I will listen to what the LORD God is saying; for you speak peace to your faithful people and to those who turn their hearts to you.
- <sup>9</sup>Truly, your salvation is very near to those who fear you, that your glory may dwell in our land.
- 10Steadfast love and faithfulness have met together; righteousness and peace have kissed each other.
- <sup>11</sup>Faithfulness shall spring up from the earth, and righteousness shall look down from heaven.
- <sup>12</sup>The LORD will indeed grant prosperity, and our land will yield its increase.
- <sup>13</sup>Righteousness shall go before the LORD and shall prepare for God a pathway.

## READING: 2 Peter 3:8-15a

This short letter deals with pressing concerns regarding the final advent of Jesus, especially concerns that could arise over its apparent delay. The author of the letter calls on Christians to anticipate the promised coming of the Lord through conduct dedicated to God.

A reading from 2 Peter.

<sup>8</sup>Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. <sup>9</sup>The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. <sup>10</sup>But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed.


<sup>11</sup>Since all these things are to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be in leading lives of holiness and godliness, <sup>12</sup>waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set ablaze and dissolved, and the elements will melt with fire? <sup>13</sup>But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home.

<sup>14</sup>Therefore, beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish; <sup>15a</sup>and regard the patience of our Lord as salvation.







During the four Sundays of Advent and Christmas Eve we will once again be adding items to our worship space which sustain us in our waiting and help guide us into the joyous celebration of the birth of our Savior. Each week those items will be noted in this bulletin insert.

On this second Sunday of Advent we introduce the banner and evergreens and candles around the altar. The banner enriches our worship space as we build to the conclusion of Advent and the celebration of Christmas Eve. Candles bring us a little more light than last Sunday. We recall the words of John 8:12 where Jesus states, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." In this season of waiting and of darkness this new light helps move us closer to the true light of Christmas. Hanging greenery goes back to ancient Rome. Evergreen roping and wreaths were hung in homes and buildings as a sign of victory. Evergreens include not only fir, cedar, and pine, but also ivy, holly, and rosemary. Christians continued to follow the practice of hanging greens as a symbol of Jesus' victory over death. Evergreens offer a variety of symbols and traditions. Holly has become a sign of Christ's passion. The prickly leaves suggest the crown of thorns and the red berries, the blood Jesus shed for our sins. A legend says the rosemary shrub is fragrant because Mary laid the Christ child's garments on its branches. In the middle ages, rosemary was spread on the floor of homes at Christmas, and as people walked on it, a pleasant aroma filled the air. The evergreen also serves as a symbol of eternal life – always green, always fresh, and alive, everlasting. Thus, it is a symbol of the eternal promise of salvation.

One of the best-known customs for the season is the Advent wreath. The wreath and winter candle-lighting amid the growing darkness strengthen some of the Advent images found in the Bible. The unbroken circle of greens is clearly an image of everlasting life, a victory wreath, the crown of Christ, or the wheel of time itself. Christians use the wreath as a sign that Christ reaches into our time to lead us to the light of everlasting life. The four candles mark the progress of the four weeks of Advent and the growth of light. Sometimes the wreath is embellished with natural dried flowers or fruit. Its evergreen branches lead the household and congregation to the evergreen Christmas tree. In many homes, the family gathers for prayer around the wreath.
