- God came down
  - Took upon human flesh
  - Son of God, Jesus
- Jesus came down the mountain
  - o On a level plain with the people
  - Experience what the people experience
- God in Jesus aligns himself with humanity
  - o In order to do that he must experience all we experience
  - That includes temptation
    - Adam and Eve in garden
    - Israelites in wilderness
      - Temptation to not trust God with them
      - Put God to the test to provide for their needs
  - Judas
    - Give into greed and betray Jesus
  - Peter
    - Self-preservation deny Jesus 3x
- 3 gospels have this story of Jesus' temptation
  - Luke, Matthew and Mark
  - All 3 place it in the same spot
  - At the beginning of Jesus' ministry
    - Immediately following his baptism
      - Spirit descend upon him
      - Voice tells him, "You are my Son."
- The story of Jesus' baptism was the beginning to the season of Epiphany shortly after Christmas
  - o Revealing who Jesus is, "You are my son."
  - There's been great debate as to why Jesus had to be baptized
    - He is the son of God after all
    - He is fully God God come down and take on human flesh
    - The one who knew no sin. Innocent yet died, took upon sin so that we might live, be reconciled to God

- We may never know
  - Yet appears to me at least his further identification with humanity
  - We must not forget Jesus' humanity
  - To be human means to experience humanity
  - Thus he was baptized
    - Thus, he was tempted in the wilderness
  - He was given building blocks of baptism
    - His identity upheld and sustained him
    - The Spirit poured out upon him, he was not alone
      - Notice the Spirit leads him into the wilderness
      - The Spirit doesn't do the tempting
      - The Spirit does the accompanying
- Jesus alone in the wilderness (i.e., desert)
  - 3 times is he tempted by the devil
  - This is how his ministry begins
    - It is how it will end
      - Alone on a cross
      - Tempted 3 times not by the devil but by human voices
        - Chapter 23 (Luke)
          - V.35 "He saved others; let him save himself"
          - V.37 "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself"
          - V.39 "Aren't you the Messiah? Save yourself and us!"
    - Perhaps, fitting the 3 gospel writers all begin in this fashion
      - Yet again a portrait of who Jesus is
      - A prophecy of what is to come
      - A God who knows what it is to be human

- Easy to see why this passage is chosen for the first Sunday in Lent
  - 40-day journey to the cross
  - Focus on baptism
    - Time of instruction leading up to baptism on Easter
  - We will face our own temptations during this 40 days just as
    Jesus did
  - In this text Jesus gives us building blocks in our battle with temptation
  - Just as God gave Israel a set of building blocks as they entered into the promised land
  - 3 times does Jesus refute the devil's sinister ways with words from Israel's book of instruction, Deuteronomy
    - A book that drew the people nearer to their God
    - Chapter 6
      - <sup>4</sup> Hear, O Israel: The LORD is our God, the LORD alone. <sup>5</sup> You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. <sup>6</sup> Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart. <sup>7</sup> Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise. <sup>8</sup> Bind them as a sign on your hand, fix them as an emblem on your forehead, <sup>9</sup> and write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates.
    - Jesus building blocks
      - Deuteronomy 8:3
        - "One does not live by bread alone"
          - That verse ends, "but by every word that comes from the mouth of the Lord"

- Deuteronomy 6:13
  - "Worship the Lord your God and serve only him"
- Deuteronomy 6:16
  - "Do not put the Lord your God to the test"
- These building blocks, words of God, fended off the devil's lies
- You are the Son of God certainly still fresh in Jesus' mind reminded him who he was and what he was sent to do
- o Filled with the Holy Spirit building block that sustained him
- God's grace
  - We have building blocks that keep us near the cross
  - Building blocks in our own battle to not give into the devil's trickery
    - We have the word of God to lean into
      - God's words written in the Bible
        - Written upon our hearts and minds
      - Word of flesh Jesus
    - We have the Holy Spirit that strengthens and comforts
    - We have the waters of baptism that refresh and remind us whose we are
    - We have the promise
      - When we falter
      - Put our trust elsewhere, fail to worship only God, give into greed, selfish desires and self-preservation
      - We have the promise .... We are forgiven
        - We are not alone
          - Spirit accompanies us
          - Jesus is with us
            - 40 days, 40 years, every second, minute, day, month and year of our baptismal journey
            - He is with us

- He went ahead of us into the wilderness
- He met temptation head on
- He won the fight
- He experienced all that we experience
- He came down
- Aligns himself with humanity
- Where are you hungering and thirsting right now?
- What is tempting you in your 40-day journey?
- What wilderness do you currently find yourself in?
  - o Remember your building blocks
  - Trust in those building blocks
  - Lean on the solid foundation of those building blocks
  - Hear yet again the baptismal promise
    - You are mine
    - Your my beloved
    - With you I am well pleased
    - Receive the Holy Spirit poured out upon you
    - Be filled with the power of the Spirit
