From the Pastor

Dear siblings in Christ,

That greeting says something about us. We are connected...in Christ! We are connected...to his baptism! We are connected...to his death! We are connected...to his resurrection! We are connected...to each other! We

are the body of Christ, and the body of Christ has many expressions. We are young and old. We are rich and poor. We are farmers, students, nurses, administrators, educators, skilled laborers, retirees, and the list could go on and on. We are parents and grandparents, aunts and uncles. Some are married or in a committed relationship while some are single, widows or widowers. We are Republicans, Democrats, and Independents. We are of different ethnicities. We are from different communities and schools. We are each uniquely and beautifully made in the image of God. We are siblings in Christ. We are the body of Christ. We are ... children of God!

We are living in a very challenging and divisive time in our communities, state, nation, and world. Tensions are high and disagreements abound. So, how does the body of Christ live in this reality? How do we respond? How are we called to act? I believe it starts with remembering whose we are. I believe it starts with remembering even the sibling in Christ I don't agree with is ... my sibling. Part of the same body of Christ as I am. A child of God just as I am. I believe it begins remembering the two great commandments Jesus upheld, "Love the Lord your God" and "Love your neighbor as yourself." (Mark 12:30-31; Matthew 22:37-39; Luke 10:27). These are not new commandments Jesus is giving us. They are commandments God gave to Israel. Deuteronomy 6:5 states, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might." Leviticus 19:18 states, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." These commandments are central to our calling as the body of Christ. Love your neighbor...even the one you don't agree with. Love your neighbor...even the one you don't understand. Love your neighbor...even the one who seems so drastically different. Love your neighbor...even the one who dresses differently. Love your neighbor...even the one you find it hard to pray for. Love God! Love one another! Love your neighbor! What would the world look like if we could simply uphold these commandments?

Bishop Amy Current of the Southeastern Iowa Synod, our bishop, recently wrote a letter to the people of the synod that speaks to the moment we currently find ourselves in and our role in it as the church. I invite you to read it here. She reminds us,

It is the call of all Christians to engage, to pay attention, and to live in the world around us. We, as Lutheran Christians, believe that in our baptism, we have been claimed, named, forgiven, promised new life, and gifted as a child of God and in this life of faith, we are called to live in the "covenant God made with us in holy baptism: to live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth." Our culture is at a crossroads when it comes to kindness. We view kindness as an act solely on the absence of being a jerk or we see acts of kindness as beyond the reach and capability of a normal person. In the book *In Defense Of Kindness: Why It Matters, How It Changes Our Lives, and How It Can Save The World* by Bruce Reyes-Chow we find that we each can choose kindness as a new way to experience community and wholeness. We live in a world that is marked by intolerance, indif-

ference, and hostility. It is all around us and is what makes up much of the "news" of the day. It causes us to often feel as if that is the way to act. Being kind is a challenging endeavor. It is a way of being in the world that needs practice. Kindness challenges those people who are fed by being hurtful and who find worth by tearing others down. This is not the type of posture that we should leave in the world. Being kind is the most powerful way that we can invite positive change in the world. I know that even on the best of days being kind is more of an aspiration than an actual fact of life. It is not something that we can do by ourselves but perhaps in company with others we can make it a positive part of our journey. This book helps to give direction to us.

The second book for this month is *Prayers For Your Children* by James Banks. It contains 90 days of prayers for children of any age. Many parents believe in the power of prayer for their children but their lives are so full that finding time for prayer can be a challenge. 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Pastor's letter from page 1.

Bishop Current references the ELCA 2017 statement titled, "<u>Government and Civic Engagement in the United States: Disciple-</u> <u>ship in a Democracy</u>", which "holds that all residents of the United States have a responsibility to make government function well—not to abandon our democracy but to engage it in a spirit of robust civic duty. For Lutherans, this responsibility is lived out as a calling from God, expressed in the discipleship described in our baptismal promises. It is based on our understanding of how God governs human society."

We live in this calling in a variety of ways collectively as the church and individually as servants of Christ guided by "one simple but allencompassing question: is the neighbor being served?" It is a question that has many possible answers as to how we serve. Some we may agree upon, and others we will not. Yet, through it all Bishop Current writes, "I hope that we are led to love God and love our neighbor. Advocating for justice and standing with those who are poor and vulnerable is part of our baptismal call to serve."

I appreciate Bishop Current's letter to the church. As I invite you to read it, I also invite you into a discussion on the ELCA statement "Government and Civic Engagement in the United States: Discipleship in a Democracy." This will be held following worship on June 4.


Staying Connected to your Roots

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
