

For the Dear faithful servants of Christ,

Who was it that talked to you about faith when you were at home or when you were away? Who was instrumental in telling you the good news of Jesus Christ? Who lived out their life of faith daily that set an example for you to follow? For most of us, I suspect the answer might be a parent, grandparent, or another relative. That would hold true for myself as well. Following college, as I began to work in the insurance industry, it was a supervisor who shared his faith with me. At this point in my life, attending worship wasn't my biggest priority. I had been hurt by the church, didn't agree with some of its doctrines, and didn't see the need to attend corporate worship. Yet, my supervisor would daily spend a few minutes sharing his own journey of faith and then he would pray with me, for me, and for the other staff under his supervision. Ultimately, these faith -filled conversations in which the Spirit was at work, rekindled in me the spark that helped shape me into the servant of Christ I strive to be today.

Moses delivered a prayer to the Israelites prior to entering the land God had promised their ancestors that is still recited daily by people of Jewish faith. It is called the Shema. Moses made known the importance of teaching this prayer to others. "Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away." And then he states, "write them on the doorposts of your house."

There is no doubt that what we do Sunday after Sunday when we gather for worship is critical. God calls us to come and worship (Psalm 95:6-7). The importance of living together as people of God is emphasized repeatedly throughout scripture (Romans 12:16). The work we do together as the body of Christ is essential.

Yet, where do we spend the bulk of our time? Who are we around most often? Those nearest and dearest to us. Just as Moses made it known to the Israelites, so does the living word of God continue to stress the importance of having faithful conversations at home and on the go, which is instrumental in the formation of faith for each generation. It is passed down from parents to their children. It is passed down from grandparents to their grandchildren. It is passed down from aunts and uncles to nieces and nephews. It is passed down from a mentor to their mentee. It is passed down from one faithful Christian to another. (Continued on next page.)

Last year, I learned of a new opportunity through Grandview University in Des Moines called "Faith Forward." Upon presenting it to the council and seeking their feedback, approval, and commitment to this program, I applied for our congregation to be part of the initial group of participants. As you've probably already guessed, we were accepted, and I attended a two-day training at the beginning of May. We are the only congregation in the Southeastern lowa Synod in this program and join congregations from across many other states.

So, just what is this all about? Briefly, the thrust is, "weaving faith formation into the normal routines of family life through the spiritual practices of prayer, Bible reading, faith conversations, acts of service and shared mealtimes to form a faith in Christ that lasts a lifetime. Through this program, we as a congregation will be better empowered and equipped to provide resources that assist parents, grandparents, and any other people instrumental in the life of a child, youth, or young adult." 

devices are controlling them. This is specially a problem with our kids. There is a connection between the overuse of devices such as smartphones, computers, and video games and the growing mental health crisis we see today, especially in children. Too much screen time has a measurable effect on kids' brains, self-esteem, emotional development, and social skills. In *Disconnected*, a comprehensive look is given at how devices have altered the way children grow up, behave, learn, and connect with their families and friends. The author gives advice for parents on setting boundaries and engaging in concentration and mindfulness exercises. (donated)

The second book is Rough Sleepers: Dr. Jim O'Connell's Urgent Mission To Bring Healing To Homeless People by Tracy Kidder. In Rough Sleepers, the author tells the story of Dr. Jim O'Connell who organized a community of care for the city's homeless population, including those who sleep on the streets - the "rough sleepers". After Jim O'Connell graduated from Harvard Medical School and was nearing the end of his residency at Massachusetts General, the hospital's chief of medicine made a proposal: Would he defer a prestigious fellowship and spend a year helping to create an organization to bring health care to homeless citizens? That year turned into O'Connell's life's calling. The author spent five years following Dr. O'Connell and his colleagues as they worked with thousands of homeless patients. He navigated the city streets at night, offering medical care, socks, soup, empathy, humor, and friendship to some of the city's most endangered citizens. He emphasizes a style of medicine in which the patients come first, joined with their providers in what he calls a "system of friends". Kidder explores how Jim O'Connell and a dedicated group of people have improved countless lives by facing and addressing one of America's most difficult problems, instead of looking away.

Book For Children

The book for children is *Psalm Twenty-Three* illustrated by Tim Ladwig. The text of a familiar psalm comparing God to a loving shepherd accompanies illustrations which show the world of love and fear faced by an urban African -American family. The author uses urban images to renew the psalm's spiritual promise. He shows us the power of that promise for a young brother and sister who live in an embattled neighborhood. Because it is so familiar, it shows that the Lord's care and presence are real no matter who or where we are. The psalm speaks to all of us, in all times and places.






2023 MISSION SPENDING ANNUAL REPORT

OUR MISSION SUPPORT

When you give money to your local congregation through pledges or your weekly offerings, a portion of that money is shared with the Southeastern lowa Synod. This is called Mission Support.

That money is then used to help other congregations, leaders in the church, local and regional partners, ELCA churchwide ministries and global ministries, and more.

In the Southeastern Iowa Synod, 53.5% of all mission support received goes directly to the ELCA Churchwide Organization and 46.5% stays for ministry in Southeastern Iowa.









Recently, you may have received an email or text claiming to be Pastor Chad. Generally, the message is indicating he needs assistance with something and attempts to solicit a response. These are phishing and spoofing scams and should never be responded to. Also, never click on any links embedded in the email or text. When in doubt, always contact Pastor Chad directly to verify if this is legitimate. The easiest way to spot these scams is looking at the sending address of the email or number of the text message. Below is a document provided by the Office of the Bishop of the Southeastern Iowa Synod that details the anatomy of these scams.

EMAIL AND TEXT SPOOFING AND SCAMS

More and more congregations and ministries are being targeted by scammers and phishing attacks. These emails or text messages often pretend they are a pastor or bishop. The scammers ask for private conversation, or the need to for a favor, or to purchase aift cards.

These attacks are a phishing or spoofing scam. This means that the email account or phone number has probably NOT been hacked. Attackers are using an alternate email address or phone number and contacts found using A.I. software.

This kind of attack is often called CEO Phishing or Business Email Compromise. In 2019, the FBI reported that this is a \$26 billion scam.

HOW TO AVOID OR STOP SCAMS

1. Check the email address or phone number that sent the message. Modern email programs often only display the name as a default and not the email address. The attackers use this to their advantage and create addresses with the real name but use a boaus email address. Often

money or information.

using gmail or yahoo accounts. Text scammers will use area codes that are in the area you are in, claiming it is a new phone number.

- 2. Look for red flags in the tone and grammar of the email or text. Attackers will want to create a sense of urgency to prey on your desire to help. They will often claim the bishop or pastor needs something and is in a meeting. Or that they need to urgently have a private conversation. These emails will often contain misspellings, strange punctuation, or grammar that is just "off" a bit. Read messages with requests carefully.
- 3. Ask someone. Have someone else read the message for you to see if they notice anything weird. Call or email the church or synod office to check what the email address or phone number of person actually is.
- 4. Do not purchase gift cards or give out information. These scams often ask for the purchase of gift cards or want you to provide further information (for more scams.) Never share information or make purchases from a text or email request without verifying information.
- 5. Report it. Report it to the person or leadership. The chances are good that if you received a scam email or text then someone else did too. Also report it to the FCC. If you are the victim of a scam, report it to local law enforcement.

HOW IT WORKS



The attackers decide on a target (a congregation, ministry or synod) and does a search for names and email addresses of leadership.



The attackers create email addresses with a convincing name or domain to look similar to that of the leadership.



They then use software to find email addresses or phone numbers associated with their target.

They send emails or texts to the found addresses posing as a pastor or bishop to solicit
